TWO MEN ARRESTED FOR EVADING MORE THAN \$290,000 IN DUTIES AND TAXES

Singapore, 28 August 2024 – In a move to curb tax evasion, Singapore Customs successfully conducted an operation at Tuas View Square on 24 August 2024, resulting in a seizure of duty-unpaid cigarettes and two vehicles.

2 During the operation, Customs officers raided an industrial unit and found 2,701 cartons of duty-unpaid cigarettes, including some which were found on two lorries in the unit. Two male Bangladeshi nationals, aged 36 and 37, were arrested.

3 Investigations revealed both men were allegedly engaged by an unknown person to collect and repack duty-unpaid cigarettes in the industrial unit. One of the men was an employee of the company occupying the unit and he had allegedly abused his company's premises for the illicit activities.

4 All the duty-unpaid cigarettes, as well as the two lorries allegedly used in the transportation of the duty-unpaid cigarettes, were seized. The total duty and Goods and Services Tax (GST) evaded amounted to about \$292,712. Court proceedings are ongoing.

5 Buying, selling, conveying, delivering, storing, keeping, possessing or dealing with duty-unpaid goods are serious offences under the Customs Act and the GST Act. Offenders can be fined up to 40 times the amount of duty and GST evaded and/or jailed for up to six years. Vehicles used in committing such offences are also subject to forfeiture.
