## Singapore Customs arrests two men and seizes more than 2,000 cartons of duty-unpaid cigarettes

Singapore Customs arrested two male Singaporeans, aged 26 and 31, and seized more than 2,000 cartons of duty-unpaid cigarettes in an operation on 10 March 2022.

## Case information

During the operation conducted at a multi-storey carpark in the vicinity of Yishun Street 42, Singapore Customs officers observed two men standing in between two Singapore-registered vans with their side compartment doors opened. There were many brown boxes in one of the vans. Suspecting that the men were dealing with duty-unpaid cigarettes, officers conducted a check and found 2,016 cartons of duty-unpaid cigarettes in the van.

Officers also found a pouch suspected to contain controlled drugs and drug paraphernalia in the other van. The matter was referred to the Singapore Police Force for further investigation.

The duty-unpaid cigarettes and the two vans were seized, and the total duty and Goods and Services tax (GST) evaded amounted to about \$172,160 and \$13,700 respectively. Both men were arrested and investigations are ongoing.

Buying, selling, conveying, delivering, storing, keeping, possessing or dealing with duty-unpaid goods are serious offences under the Customs Act and the GST Act. Offenders can be fined up to 40 times the amount of duty and GST evaded and/or jailed for up to six years. Vehicles used in the commission of such offences are liable to be forfeited.
